## The Light in the Piazza

## Shines at AFD October 13–29

The Light in the Piazza holds all the promise of a rollicking good time at a Broadway musical: soaring melodies, romantic chemistry between two charming lovers, a sun-soaked setting in a foreign land, and some beguiling misunderstandings.

But a few bars in, it is quickly apparent how much more is at play. The music is complex and layered, the two lovers may not be destined for each other, and the mix-ups are more than comic.

There is dark to the light, atonality to the melodies, and rich, deep history to the characters, no matter how comic.

When **The Light in the Piazza** opens the new season at AFD Theatre on October 13, it will explore the nuances, as well as the humor and the delight.

Director Ryan Began notes that the story appealed to him because of its deceptive simplicity.

"The sweeping, romantic nature of the show is unlike anything I have had the opportunity to direct before," he says. "All the characters are complicated. They're real people with relationships and past lives. Life has gotten in the way and taken them down paths they didn't expect, but they're coping with it as best they can."

The unusual complexity of the story may stem from its origins as a novella by Elizabeth Spencer.


Set in the early 1950s, the plot revolves around Clara Johnson, a lovely, innocent young woman who is on holiday in Florence with her mother.

When a gust of wind lifts Clara's hat, it sparks a string of events that lands her in the arms of a charming young Italian man named Fabrizio. Clara's mother, Margaret, has to struggle with the pains and joys of letting go and moving on.

In 1962, the novella was made into a movie. In 2005, this musical version of the story opened on Broadway starring Kelli O'Hara as Clara Johnson.

The musical won five Tony Awards and the acclaim of critics and audiences.

## Piazza Profiles: Karen Fanale and Charlie Carr

#### Karen Fanale Finds the Beauty in Piazza

Born and bred in a stage family, Arlington resident Karen Fanale has been a natural star since the very beginning—more or less. Her mother owned a children's theater company in Rochester, NY, where she had her first role—as Nana in a production of **Peter Pan**—when she was three or four. It wasn't an unmitigated success, as she notes, "A few times I was too scared to come out of the dog house."

Since then, she has reveled in the spotlight, using her acting and singing skills on stage and screen in many contexts. In October, she will light up the stage at AFD Theatre, where she will star as Margaret Johnson in the lushly romantic and melodic musical **The Light in the Piazza.** 

Karen participated in productions all the way through school, finally pursuing a degree in Theater Arts, and then a Masters in Theater. When she realized she didn't want to teach, she headed to New York City, where she performed in a few productions.

Finally, she hit the road, and traveled around doing dinner theater in Florida and Maine. "I'd never waitressed before, and it was difficult to be both serving and singing. It was very hard work."

Eventually she moved to Boston, where she has worked consistently in film and on stage. She was an extra in "Mystic River" and "Pollack," as well as the television shows "Law and Order SVU" and "Sex and the City." At AFD, she's appeared in **A Little Night Music**, and last season she starred as Mrs. Robinson in **The Graduate**.

This season marks the third time she has appeared in **The Light in the Piazza** in the last few years. At SpeakEasy Stage in Boston, she was the tour guide and a member of the ensemble. At Vokes Theatre, she was Signora Nacarelli, the mother of the young male lead.

Ryan Began, the director, expresses his excitement about both the play and Karen's performance.

"Karen brings a balance and an understatement to the character of Margaret that's not there in every production. She finds the dark humor in this woman's life, who's lived and carried the burden of what happened to her daughter."

#### **Charlie Carr Wears Many Hats at AFD**

He just barely missed boarding the Titanic, was a major movie producer mogul, and got to be one of the last hot lovers. In October, he will be several different denizens of Florence, watching two young people fall madly in love in late summer light while singing in Italian.

Arlington resident Charlie Carr has done all this on the stage at AFD Theatre—but that's just the beginning. He has also done nearly every job in a theatrical production, and most of it at AFD—from designing sets to pounding nails, from doing makeup to running a spotlight, and, finally, taking the stage.

In fact, these days, AFD Theatre provides a second home, where he has good friends and a whole lot to do. Charlie has been active at the theatre for over 30 years, and lately his commitment has grown even more. Since he retired three years ago, the theater is his main activity and his first love. "You do have to love it." he says, "Especially at the community level, we're here because we enjoy it. We all want to be part of an active group of people who are making theater. It's about companionship and involvement."

He wasn't planning to audition for **Piazza**, but when the call came out for male singers, he jumped in—AFTER he'd made sure there'd be no dancing. "I can't dance at all," he says. "In one production, I had to move around, and the poor woman who was my partner had to drag me around the stage."

That said, however, he can sing. "Although I haven't had any real singing lessons, I can read music and I have a pretty good voice."

Charlie has been involved with AFD since 1986. He started out in **The Rope Dancers**, directed by Dot Santos. He has stayed active on and off since then, and has done nearly every job in a production. "I usually help build the sets, no matter what," he says. He witnessed all the changes through the major renovation that transformed the lobby and the workshop. He notes that the technical capabilities have grown more advanced since he began. "Everything is more sophisticated now," he says. "The lights, the soundboard."

One of his favorite productions was **Titanic** in 2004, directed by James Grana. "I played about five parts in that one: the guy who runs down the aisle at the beginning and misses the ship, the engineer who builds the ship, a steerage passenger, a gambler, and a blowhard English soldier. It was a tremendous production."
